



Graduation Grade Calculation (from July 2025)

Starting from the basic mark calculated by the student secretariats from the marks of the profit examinations (weighted average of the marks obtained multiplied by 11/3), the following may be added:

- a. up to 10 points for experimental theses (of which up to 8 proposed by the supervisor and up to 2 proposed by the Commission*);
- b. up to 7.5 points for semi-experimental theses (of which up to 6 proposed by the supervisor and up to 1.5 proposed by the Commission*);
- c. up to 5 points for bibliographic theses (of which up to 4 proposed by the supervisor and up to 1 proposed by the Commission*);
- d. up to 1 point for graduation on time (up to the March/April session): 1 for bachelor's and single-cycle master's degree, and 0.5 points for master's degrees;
- e. up to 1 point for examinations carried out in Erasmus programmes;
- f. up to 2 points (1 point for periods ≤ 6 months; 2 points for periods > 6 months) for experimental theses carried out as part of institutional mobility projects abroad.

For the awarding of honours (*laude*), students who achieve a score of at least 102.00 (not rounded upwards) derived from the sum of (i) weighted average of the marks of the profit examinations as drawn up by the secretariats and (ii) any additional marks as per points d., e., f. - [graduation on time, Erasmus, and experimental thesis carried out abroad].

*The Commission will use the following criteria based on the Dublin Descriptors in assigning marks:

1. Ability to set out clearly and comprehensibly to the Commission the purpose of the thesis and its place in the broader State of the Art framework.
2. Use of appropriate expository language.
3. Ability to organise the presentation effectively, including by adhering to the set timeframe.
4. Ability to answer questions clearly.
